The purpose of CHYA is to provide students with...



- > The **knowledge and skills to protect** their sexual and reproductive health.
- The knowledge and skills to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth, development, body image, relationships, etc.
- > The understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development.
- Integrated, comprehensive, accurate, and unbiased sexual health and HIV prevention instruction.
- The knowledge and skills necessary to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors.


What will these lessons look like?

Key Curricular Points



- Age-appropriateness was carefully considered when placing topics in 7th/8th grade.
- All information shared with students is medically accurate.
- Content is aligned with the California Healthy Youth Act (CHYA) and Health Education Standards.
- Teachers can adjust instructional strategies and resources (Kahoot, Google Forms, etc.) to meet the needs of their students.

Opting Out of Health Education

What are parents' rights and what is the process to opt out of health education?



Opt Out Rights

Summary

- Per state law (Ed. Code 31938(a)), parents have the right to **opt their child out of part or all** of comprehensive sexual health education
 - under the <u>California Healthy Youth Act</u>, all comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention instruction and materials in grades K-12 must be inclusive of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and/or queer (LGBTQ) students. Instruction must affirmatively recognize that people have different sexual orientations and, when discussing or providing examples of relationships and couples, must be inclusive of same-sex relationships. It must also teach students about gender, gender expression, gender identity, and explore the harm of negative gender stereotypes. This means that schools are required to teach about sexual orientation and transgender, cisgender, and non-binary gender identities. Learn more <u>here</u>.
- Parents must be notified about sexual health education

What is the Opt-Out Process?



- Parents receive notification (March 29, 2024) about sexual health education from district/site administration & SDUHSD passive consent information
 - Notification to be sent a minimum of 14 days prior to the start of instruction
 - Information may also be accessed on the <u>health website</u> beginning March 29, 2024.
- Parents are able to opt out of some or ALL of the Health Education units
- Parents must submit a written request that they want to opt out their child from sexual health education to school administration (letter or email is appropriate)
 - Students under the age of 18 are unable to opt-out themselves
- Students who are opted-out of health education will complete **alternative assignments** during CHYA education class time
 - All parents may access curricular materials on the health website, beginning March
 29 should they wish to use these resources with their children at home
